TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the (L. S.) county of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 9th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

- 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year. that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall: for the protection of persons and property, including the police department, moth extermination and extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including

state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

- 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.
- 5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August 1st, 1943.
- 6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.
- 7. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$\frac{1}{2}\$; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$295.92.
- 8. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$130.00 (Petition).
- 9. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expenses of such audit.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to ratify, confirm and approve the action of the Board of Selectmen, in making complete payment for the Fire Truck.

- 11. To see if the town will vote whether or not to contine printing the Vital Statistics in the Town Report. (Optional by legislation.)
- 12. To see if the town will vote to place the present sewer system under the supervision of the Board of Water Commissioners.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to transfer the annual sewer appropriation to take care of the needs of the sewer system, to be expended under direction of the Water Commissioners, and make any necessary reasonable increase in the pay of the superintendent in view of added duties.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for new equipment for sewer maintenance.

REPORT OF SCHOOL DISTRICT OF NEWMARKET, N. H.

1941-1942

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure that I submit my first annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

Although I have been working with your schools for only two months an endeavor will be made to present the usual interesting statistics for 1941-1942 as well as some of the activities of the present school year.

Newmarket is very fortunate in having such a large percentage of experienced teachers. There have been, however, several changes in the teaching force since last year. New teachers are: Miss Marjorie Howe from Keene Teachers' College. teaching Grade IV at Primary School: Miss Eleanor Govoni, a graduate of Boston University, teaching Grade V at the Stone School. At the High School, new teachers in September were: Miss Elizabeth Doe, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College, who had taught one year at Farmington, teaches commercial work. Miss Ruth Trudel, a graduate of Rivier College, teaches English and Biology, and coaches girls basketball, and Mr. Sherburne Buckler, a graduate of Rutgers University, who had taught one year at Stonington, Conn., teaches social studies. In December Dorothy Brewster, who resigned as teacher of Home Economics, to accept work with the Extension Service, was replaced by Miss Margaret Hyder of Lawrence, Mass. Miss

Hyder was graduated from Regis College in 1942. In January, 1943, Mr. Putnam who had been teaching English, entered the service and was replaced by Miss Beatrice Mercurio, a graduate from Boston University, from Medford, Mass. Mr. Sideris, who has just been graduated from U. N. H., has been engaged as a cadet teacher for the remainder of the year.

The teachers have taken their additional part in the war effort by working on war rationing programs. Teachers and pupils are to be commended for the extent to which the pupils have purchased war stamps and bonds. Since September, pupils at the Stone School have invested a total of \$428.60, or an average of about \$6.60 per pupil. In addition to buying war stamps, children in the fifth and sixth grade have collected or located for the war effort 566 lbs. of rubber, 164 lbs. fat, 1466 lbs. of scrap iron, 1710 tin cans, and 9 lbs. of silk. \$19.40 realized from the sale of junk metal collected by the children is being used for films which are shown at the Primary school, by the use of the picture machine owned by the district.

During my visits to the schools, I find them well managed and neat, the pupils are well behaved, the lessons well prepared by the teachers and a general atmosphere of happiness and industry prevails. The buildings are in good condition generally and are functioning efficiently with the exception of the High School heating system which is in the process of being remedied.

An article in the January, 1943, issue of the School Executive magazine states concisely and em-

phatically regarding education after the war in Great Britain that, "of all the State's activities, education is the basic activity, because it conditions the future character of the entire community. In peacetime no temporary economic crisis should be permitted to have any effect at all upon educational services. In wartime the maintenance of these services at a level of high efficiency should have maximum priority." This thought should continue to prevail in our own country.

The Newmarket schools may be likened to the American school as a whole, as described in the following quotation from a recent United States Office of Education publication: "I do not consider it an overstatement to say that the United States owes much of its economical social and political power as a nation to the organization and efficiency of its education. Though the American school was born out of the basic needs of the country, it is now the result of continuous striving for improvement."

Reading, which is the foundation subject of all education, is being stressed in all grades. At the primary school, Miss Evans and Miss Desprez, teach Grade one and two respectively, are carrying on a very well organized and effective program in remedial reading with the slower pupils in grades three and four in addition to work done with their own grades. This additional help is given during the time after which the younger children are dismissed.

If our boys and girls are to make as few mistakes as possible in the running of our government when they become adults, our schools must train them in organization, leadership and the Democratic way of living. This is being done through the group organizations in the upper grades. The various groups elect their own officers and conduct meetings during which many items of business are transacted. It is very satisfying to visit a class room and find a well conducted meeting, being run by the pupils under the guidance of the teacher, in progress. Detailed information concerning Newmarket High School will be found in Headmaster McCaffrey's report. Spirit, discipline and achievement are excellent under his leadership.

These individuals as well as their parents are to be complimented for this showing of such faithful attendance. The comparatively small number of tardinesses and absences in Newmarket schools as a whole indicates exceptional cooperation on the part of all concerned as well as that the pupils are forming proper habits of punctuality and regularity.

Schools are being effected in many ways by war conditions. War is no respector of individual needs. There is already an acute shortage of teachers The defense boom, with acute living costs, has compelled low salaried teachers to accept better wages in industry. The result is keener competition everywhere to secure and keep good teachers. The cost of text books and supplies is increasing. Shortage in materials are getting more noticeable. We must attempt to conserve on their use by continued effort to prevent waste or abuse of materials.

The greatest task before the American people is to win the war. To this end our utmost energy and our best thoughts are dedicated, but we must not be unmindful of the peace and world reconstruction which must follow. We are confronted now with decisions that will determine the kind of citizens who will inherit this country of ours. We

must keep constantly before us the fact that children can not delay the growing-up process. "What they will be, they are now becoming."

Your attention is directed to the attached report regarding the work of the School Nurse, Miss Margaret MacDonald.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the members of the school board, teachers and citizens of Newmarket for their cooperation during my first two months of service and I hope to carry on effectively the work of the schools in the future.

NURSE'S REPORT

It may be of interest to Newmarket parents to know that dental defects are on the increase in schools.

In September, 1931, we had in our schools 41 per cent of the pupils in need of dental care. That meant days lost with toothaches or ailments resulting from abscessed teeth. A dental clinic was organized and continued annually with results for eight years. By June, 1939, defects were reduced to 15 per cent. Due to lack of interest and funds by parents and organizations, the dental clinic had to be discontinued. Since the last clinic was held January-February, 1939, defects have gradually increased and in June, 1942, reached 44 per cent. Some effort should be made to keep bodies physi-

cally fit. Pupils of today are the future citizens of tomorrow.

NEWMARKET HIGH SCHOOL

To the School Board, Superintendent and Citizens of Newmarket:

The administration of a public high school in time of war is not exempt from the many inconveniences and problems which likewise effect the home, the church and the shop. In fact, increased responsibilities and expectations make that task an even more difficult challenge.

Through the foresight of the school board and superintendent we have not been handicapped by a shortage of school books or supplies of any kind. These purchases were made far in advance and have been a definite help to us.

We could not, however, expect to go through the year without faculty changes. A shift in occupation and a call from the service took two of our experienced teachers which, of course, necessitated some readjustment in the program.

We were proud to announce that seven of our senior boys, Victor Dutka, Lionel Rousseau, Henry Hogue, Emery Houle, Dean Carder, Richard Bolduc and John Reardon had enlisted in the navy and marines which has reduced the size of the present senior class. It is not unlikely that more will follow before the current school year has expired.

The major change in the curriculum has been the introduction of the half year course aeronautics which has a registration of thirty-five students. This course meets the prescribed standards of the Army and will be of great value to boys entering the service as well as a background for all in the air world of tomorrow.

In order to keep pace with the demands of the services and colleges, United States Constitutional History is offered to the Juniors in order that they may complete the course by the end of the first semester of their senior year thus giving the boys who enter the service and high ranking students who go to college the full prescribed course as recommended by the State Department of Education.

Physical fitness is being introduced for boys in the Junior and Senior classes. This program includes forty minutes a day in organized exercise, games and competition. This is designed to build up the health of all the group and is meeting with great enthusiasm. It is hoped that a similar program will be available to the girls soon.

Army Clerical Typing has been introduced for boys. This covers the various forms and methods required in the Army and Navy offices. Several boys have selected it. This will prepare boys for specialized service.

Our guidance program has been expanded so that we now have a very complete record of the health, scholarship, personality, and ability of all our students. Examinations were given to determine aptitude for school work and charts kept to measure the achievement in this basis. We have found this helpful in conference with parents as well as useful in pointing out to pupils their strong points or shortcomings. The personality charts show how the various teachers rate the student in all of the phases of school citizenship.

Training in the fundamentals has continued with emphasis on spelling and geography.

Other school activities have included the Camera Club, Home Eck Club, the Yearbook, Senior Play and Public Speaking.

Rationing has curtailed our athletic program, yet we completed a full football schedule and by forming a Victory League in basketball have continued on a representative basis. We have tried to keep athletics in its proper place as part of the educational program.

Our school attendance as usual rated high in the state—this is a credit to the students and parents who wish to get the fullest advantage of a secondary education.

The noon lunch program has met with favorable response with some fifty pupils being served hot dishes at a low cost of five cents. Pasteurized milk was available for one half the year at a low cost of one cent per half pint bottle.

New aerial maps, wall and global, were purchased to bring to the school the very latest of geography perspectives. In addition, the sound projector has allowed the students the enrichment of the latest films.

Teacher and student participation in the various registrations were a great service to the people. This was done without any loss of actual school time.

The school cooperated in harvesting of apples and other fruits and vegetables in this area. Over twenty-five boys took part. The United States Employment Office in Dover extended appreciation to the school for this service.

A survey of the Class of 1942 shows six entered the University of New Hampshire, two Colby Junior College, four the United States Navy, one the United States Army, five in defense jobs out of town, three in secretarial positions, and six in local industry.
