## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the protection of persons and property, including the police department; for health and sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics and sewer maintenance; for highways and bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for education, including the public library; for charities, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for recreation, including band concerts; for cemeteries; for interest; for new construction and improvements, including state aid and town construction; for indebtedness, payments to other Governmental Divisions, including county tax, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said Town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to borrow money for neces-

sary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

4. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount of 2 per cent on all taxes, except poll taxes, if paid within 15 days after receipt of bill.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

5. To see if the Town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$47.00 in addition to that required by law.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as submitted by the Budget Committee.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

7. Shall the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of Beano be adopted in this Town.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase the Ford Tractor with all equipment, including loader and bucket, snow plow blade, side mower, grease guns, etc., now owned by Mrs. Walter Wajda, at a cost of \$3,000.00 and to pay for the same with parking meter receipts.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

9. To see if the Town will install a hydrant on Exeter Road in a suitable place between the residences of Fred Wright and Alfred Brisson on said road.

(Petitioned)



10. To see if the Town will extend rubbish collection on Exeter Road to the residence of Alfred Brisson on said road and to raise \$300.00 for same.

(Petitioned)

11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new safe to keep the vital records of the Town, as the present one is not large enough, and to raise \$378.00 to purchase said safe.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

12. To see if the Town will vote to empower the Selectmen to appoint a deputy collector of taxes at no cost to the Town.

13. To see if the Town will vote to omit the printing of vital statistics in the annual Town Report.

14. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting for the past two years, and to raise \$200.00 to cover the expense of such audit.

(Recommended by the Budget Committee)

15. To see if the Town will vote to accept the roads in the Maplecrest Housing Project.

16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint a Zoning Commission of five members to recommend to the next Town Meeting the boundaries of zoning districts and appropriate regulations to be enforced therein, in accordance with Sections 50-71 inclusive, Chapter 51, Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942, as amended. The Zoning Commission to make a preliminary report and hold public hearings thereon before submitting its final report to Town Meeting for action.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$200.00 to be used for the care of the baseball field.

10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate \$150.00 to be used for installing new lights in one room in the Central School.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise or appropriate the sum of \$5,784.63 as a Deficiency Appropriation for the school year 1950-51.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

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## PRINCIPAL'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It is with pleasure to be able once again to submit this annual report to you.

### TEACHERS

Newmarket High School was once again plagued by that ever present teacher turnover problem. Four out of nine teachers resigned in June—too great a number for continuity of progress from one year to the next. Mr. Ramsey was fortunate, however, in securing experienced personnel to fill the vacancies. Mrs. Mary Sakowski, Salem Teachers' College, former commercial teacher here, replaced Barbara DeNute, who resigned to get married. Mrs. Carol Jackson, Keene Teachers' College, replaced Katherine Walsh who also resigned to get married. Mrs. Jackson resigned on December 21, 1951 and she was replaced by Mrs. Dwight Killam of Kingston who will

substitute until a regular replacement can be found. Raymond LeBouthillier, University of New Hampshire, replaced Howard Jackson who resigned to go into other work. Leo Landroche, Plymouth Teachers' College, replaced John Economopoulos who resigned to become Principal of Henniker High school.

### CURRICULUM

Numerous changes were made in our program of studies this past year in order to make Newmarket High School more functional and thus better serve the community.

We now have a two-year woodworking high school shop program. Mr. Marcoux is the instructor and it is a natural carry over from his Junior High school shop program. In order to make this new program really worthwhile, it was necessary to equip the shop with several new machine tools. We now have a shop that has the following: lathe, jig-saw, grinders, shaper, circular saw, hand saw, drill press, and jointer-plainer. It is needless to say that with this equipment a great deal can be accomplished in woodworking.

It was necessary to relieve Mr. Marcoux of some of his duties in order to give him time for the new shop program, so Charles Beattie, University of Maine, was added to the faculty to teach his Junior High School math and science classes.

Auto-driving was dropped because of the lack of a qualified instructor and for a lack of a sufficient number of qualified students. This course should be reintroduced next year inasmuch as accident records on school trained drivers indicate that it is a successful method of driver training.

A new subject, non-college physical science, was introduced this year. It fills a very important gap in our program, for it gives the non-academic student an opportunity to study science on his own interest

and need level, and a chance to gain some insight into the basic sciences.

Our program of studies, in short, contains the following courses: college preparatory, commercial, home-economics, general and a new addition this year—a two year high school woodworking shop. This should grow eventually into a regular diversified four year program.

Educationally, the above program is good, but it could be better—be even more functional and thus better serve the needs of the community. Not too much can be done, however, at the present time to expand our offerings without further additions to the faculty and to the physical plant.

Our music program, under the direction of Mr. Robert Bouchard, is a balanced one and is filling a long felt need by the addition of free band instrument lessons, and as an outcome, Newmarket High School will have a band worthy of respect in the near future. Inasmuch as the members of the band consist mostly of seventh, eighth, and ninth grade pupils, and as all are relatively new music students, time is the only determining factor for complete success. The Girls' Glee Club has been active all fall and participated in the Parents' Night entertainment and the Christmas program. At the present time the seventh and eighth grades are completing plans for the presentation of an operetta entitled "Thirty Minutes on the Range."

Our athletic and physical education program is still as before—the only changes being in coaching personnel. Mr. Leo Landroche is the new cross country and basketball coach. Mr. Charles Beattie is the new girls' basketball and boys' baseball coach.

The cross country team met with considerable success last fall when it won ten out of twelve meets, annexed the Southeastern B League Championship

title and came in second in the state-wide Class B meet which was held at Durham.

Our physical education program is still a hit and miss affair, depending upon good weather in order to function at all. There is no winter program whatsoever because of lack of personnel and suitable facilities. There can be but little improvement in this department under present conditions.

### EXTRA-CURRICULAR

The extra-curricular program is vital and fortunately dynamic. All classes participate in assembly programs, running dances and parties, presenting plays, and other forms of entertainment.

The Student Council actively participates in school and state activities. We are proud of the fact that Newmarket High School is a charter member of the New Hampshire Student Association of Student Councils. Our representatives to the state meetings feel that much benefit is derived from these conventions.

The Junior Class publishes annually a yearbook which has been both a financial and editorial success. In the past three years the Lamprey has won a first and two third place awards in the Columbia University Interscholastic Press Competition.

In the past year and one-half, the students, through their own efforts, have purchased a tape recorder with radio, an automatic three-speed record player, and a complete public address system. These instruments constitute a very important addition to our audio-visual equipment.

### BUILDING

Thanks to our custodian "Denny" you have one of the cleanest and best kept buildings in the State. I cannot thank him enough for all that he has done for me and the rest of the faculty.

## THE FUTURE

There are many things that can be done to improve the secondary educational program in Newmarket. Some should be done at once, while others can wait. In my estimation the continuation of the high school shop program is a must and it should be expanded in the fall to include the last two years of high school, not only as a woodworking shop, but as a completely diversified industrial arts program.

The addition of a physical education program would prove beneficial to your children and also fill in a serious gap in our curriculum.

## THANKS

Thanks must be given to the newly organized Newmarket Service Club for the time, effort, and money that was expended in building two showers and a dressing room in the town hall. Also, I wish to give thanks for the new deal at the town hall—for the removal of the balcony and the attention being given to the building itself.

I wish to thank those who have done so much to make the past year a success. In an undertaking such as this, one man cannot do it alone—it requires the cooperation of students, teachers, Superintendent, Board of Education, and parents. I am pleased to report that there has been and still is a high degree of cooperation among these groups.

In closing let me state that we are making educational progress, but we have nothing about which to become complacent. We must make continual progress if we are to successfully educate our children.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

It gives me a good deal of pleasure to submit this my second annual report as your Superintendent.

Newmarket can be proud of its schools; your school board and superintendent have made every effort to elect teachers that would maintain the high level of instruction you have enjoyed in the past. I would ask you to remember that to maintain and hold a good professional teaching staff there must be an adequate salary schedule and there must be adequate tools of instruction such as text books, supplies and equipment. All this must necessarily be reflected in your school budget.

Two new courses have been added to the high school program. The two year high school shop program has filled a need of long standing; this should be extended to four years as soon as possible. The Physical Science Course has met a need in grades 11 and 12, for those boys and girls not interested in Chemistry and Physics as such but want a more general course in advanced science.

The additional teacher at the high school has made these new courses possible and has been a fine investment for the future of Newmarket's young people.

As part of this report there will be a page devoted to Return of District Revenue, which shows the actual budget that the school district is using this year. (1951-52)

### NEW TEACHERS

Raymond W. LeBouthillier, U.N.H. '50 to replace Howard W. Jackson who resigned to go into the insurance business. Mr. LeBouthillier comes to Newmarket from Orford High school where he was science and mathematics teacher.

Leo A. Landroche, P.T.C. 1949 to replace John Economopoulos who resigned to accept the position of principal of Henniker High school. Mr. Landroche comes to Newmarket to teach social studies and coach basketball after a successful year and one half at Lancaster.

Charles A. Beattie, University of Maine, '50 to teach junior high mathematics and science and general mathematics. Mr. Beattie was elected as an added teacher to free Mr. Marcoux for the high school shop program.

Mary Rheault Sakowski, Salem Teachers College '49 to replace Miss Barbara DeNute who resigned to accept a position in a business office in Manchester. Mrs. Sakowski returns to the Commercial department after a year's absence.

Mrs. Carol Jackson, K.T.C., 1949 to replace Miss Catherine Walsh who resigned to be married. Mrs. Jackson comes to us after a year of successful teaching in the home economics department, Jaffrey High school.

Mrs. Irene LaBranche, 3rd grade, Lowell Teacher's College and Boston University to replace Mrs. Blanche Loch, who resigned because of ill health. Mrs. LaBranche comes to us with many years of successful teaching in Haverhill, Mass.

Mrs. Gloria Gendron, grade 6, University of N. H. '49 to replace Mrs. Jeannette Hendzel. Mrs. Gendron comes to us after one year of successful teaching in Brentwood.

#### TESTING PROGRAM

A Union wide testing program has been instituted this year. Children in grades 4, 6, and 8 were tested in October by the University of New Hampshire counseling service. Grades 4 and 6 were given Mental Efficiency tests plus Achievement tests in Reading, Arithmetic and English. Grade 8 was



given a battery of tests which included, Interest Inventory, Mental Efficiency, Mechanical Aptitudes and Comprehensive Reading. Grade 8 tests shall be used as a medium for counseling and guiding pupils into selection of a high school program best fitted for them in terms of interest and abilities.

These tests are in the hands of the respective teachers who would welcome the opportunity to sit down with any and all interested parents for a discussion of their child's problems as indicated by the tests. Naturally these tests are not infallible, but they are immeasurable help when supplemented by the teacher's judgment. I urge parents to take advantage of this opportunity to sit down with the teacher and discuss their child objectively.

#### GUIDANCE

As the value of a testing program must be measured by its use and because the State Department recognizes the value of a full time Counselor in Guidance Work, the Union has voted a sum of money to pay part of such a man's salary. The State Department of Education has consented to match the amount voted by the Union in order to set up a pilot program on a supervisory union basis. This program will be the only such program in the state and will be closely supervised by your Superintendent and the State Guidance Director. It should prove of great value to Newmarket in that it will make available a man trained in counseling techniques to work with parents, teachers, and children in working toward the solution of problems in maladjustment, truancy, and others common to the advanced or retarded pupil.

#### Repairs and Replacements

Newmarket's school buildings are reaching the age where plumbing and equipment are wearing out. Unforseen leaks in plumbing fixtures are ex-

pensive to repair; the sewer pipe at the central school needs cleaning of probable roots that seem to be clogging the system, the lighting program should be continued and typewriters should be exchanged for new. All these things cost money, but none of them can be overlooked. You are fortunate in having two janitors who take pride in their work and who keep your buildings in tip-top condition.

### HOT LUNCH

The hot lunch program has been a continued success, but like most such programs it has outgrown its facilities. By the addition of a two or three compartment sink and re-arrangement of the kitchen much valuable space could be added to the kitchen. This would give much more shelf room for storage as well as for preparation of food.

Because voluntary help is becoming increasingly hard to find, I would recommend that part of the money raised by the school district be used to hire a full time helper for the cook, such a person could be responsible for the keeping of records and making out the necessary reports. I feel that to insure the continued success of the program the above recommendations need to be followed.

### LOOKING AHEAD

I don't believe there is much question about what will happen to Newmarket's school population when the present housing project is completed and Newington Air Base becomes a reality. The time has come for the citizens of Newmarket to study their school facilities objectively and ask themselves the "\$64.00 question." "Are we ready for an influx of pupils in our schools?"

In closing I wish to congratulate the school board and citizens on their support of their schools, and to thank the school board for their friendly and help-

ful spirit of cooperation. It has been a real pleasure working with you.

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## REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools, Newmarket School Board, and citizens of Newmarket:

I am pleased to submit to you my second annual report on music education in your schools.

### ELEMENTARY SCHOOL MUSIC

Music instruction in the elementary grades this year was enriched by the addition of three important, relatively new teaching aids, namely: The American Singer Audio-Educational series, Rhythm Band instruments, and the Tonette.

Special phonograph records were purchased from the American Book Company to reinforce the American Singer Book series as an additional, practical teaching tool. These records are one of the basic implements which a teacher can use to develop children's enjoyment of singing and playing, and the ability to listen to music. They are adaptable instruments for helping children to recognize good performance, to feel such aspects of music as mood, tempo, variety in style, and to develop pleasure in creating and listening to music. These records are used in many ways. For example, they can be used:

1. For listening, when beginning the study of a new song;
2. With children, who are learning a song, to illustrate special qualities as phrasing, tempo or tone quality;
3. With children who have learned a series of songs for the enjoyment of "singing alone";

4. As accompaniment in developing rhythmic action to a song;

5. As accompaniment for creative and dramatic play-interpretation of music.

In addition to the audio-educational aids, all pupils in grades one, two and three play in a Rhythm Band. Each grade has its own band. There is no activity which affords more opportunity for individual expression and group coordination than the Rhythm Ensemble. While the experience of participation in a Rhythm Band is an enjoyable one, there are also important benefits directly derived therefrom. The fine muscular control which emerges as a result of this training gives a good background for any further studies in instrumental music. The feeling for meter and rhythmic variation helps him develop poise and balance. And perhaps most important is the knowledge that his efforts help to form the whole group into a functioning unit.

The use of the Tonette program in our fourth, fifth and sixth grades has filled a very definite want in our school music schedule.

Children are taught to sight-read and sing part music much more quickly, effectively and in a more interesting manner. They have greater enjoyment for vocal work because of a knowledge of the language of music.

Pre-band instruments develop muscular coordination and lay the foundation for instrumental techniques. There is no tone production problem, and young students concentrate upon music reading and finger technique. Pre-band instrument classes permit large groups of children to explore the field of instrumental music at very low cost.

## HIGH SCHOOL MUSIC

Musical activities in Newmarket High School are

composed of the following groups: Instrumental ensembles, two music appreciation classes and a High School Girls' Glee Club.

The instrumental ensembles vary in number from two to five players. They receive thirty minutes instruction weekly, mostly after school hours.

The music appreciation classes meet once a week for forty minutes. Musical offerings in these classes include:

1. A study of famous composers and their works.
2. Music history.
3. Unison and two-part singing to piano accompaniment.
4. An understanding of beautiful music in song and on record.

Membership in the Girls' Glee Club is on a voluntary rather than a selective basis and I am happy to report that more girls have joined this year. Weekly rehearsals are held in auditorium every Tuesday morning. This year the Glee Club took part in the National Education Week program and with the Junior Class sponsored the Annual School Christmas Assembly.

Our plans for the remainder of the year include sending representatives to the All-State Music Festival at Rochester, a Spring Concert and Graduation Week Exercises.

To the School Board and citizens of Newmarket:

The greatest aid for better health of the elementary children Newmarket will be better oral hygiene and corrective dental care.

One hundred sixty children this past year had

their teeth cleaned. If parents will only carry on and take children to a dentist every year, it will help greatly to solve our problem. Grades seven and eight, also High School have shown a big improvement the past few years, but let's start earlier.

The hot lunch program started last year. It is a grand project for the school children. We have had fine cooperation, but still need added cooperation this year from the parents if hot lunch is to be a success in Newmarket.

Nineteen children attended "Day at School" in June, getting acquainted with school and the teacher. All children were weighed, measured, and examined by the Nurse. T.B. Patch Tests are being done this year also. We have promise of Chest X-Ray for our school children when the Mobile Unit returns to Newmarket.

Eight children had glasses paid for, three went to the orthopedic clinic and four to the doctor.

I wish to express thanks again to the School Board, all other organizations, teachers, parents and Sisters of St. Mary's School for their loyal cooperation.
